**BETH REED OF NAVY AND NATALJA STANSKI OF GRAND VALLEY TOP
ESPN THE MAGAZINE'S ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA® WOMEN'S SOCCER TEAM**

TOWSON, Md. — Senior goalkeeper **Beth Reed** of the United States Naval Academy and senior defender **Natalja Stanski** of undefeated Grand Valley State University headline the 2009 *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® Women's Soccer Teams, as selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

Reed and Stanski have been named as the winners of the Academic All-America® of the Year award in the University and College Divisions, respectively.

A Mechanical Engineering major with a 3.97 G.P.A., Reed ranks second in Overall Order of Merit among the 1,064 midshipmen in the Class of 2010. She has held the top ranking in her class in Academic Order of Merit in five of her six semesters at the Naval Academy. The Indianapolis, Indiana native also ranks sixth among her classmates in Military Order of Merit and has been named to the Superintendent's List five times.

In her first season as the starting goalkeeper at Navy, Reed led the Mids to a 14-5-2 record and a berth in the Patriot League Tournament. A first team All-Patriot League selection, she was also named as the Patriot League Goalkeeper of the Year. During the 2009 season, she was honored as the Patriot League Goalkeeper of the Week three times.

Honored as the Patriot League's Scholar-Athlete for women's soccer, Reed led the Patriot League with a 0.69 Goals Against Average. She set a Navy single season record with nine solo shutouts and made 97 saves in 21 games. Reed, who also plays basketball at Navy, is tied for 12th in NCAA Division I with a .875 save percentage.

Reed is the second consecutive Navy goalkeeper to be named to the Academic All-America® University Division Women's Soccer first team. Last year, **Lizzie Barnes** was honored as the first team goalkeeper.

Reed is one of 12 Scholar-Athletes to be named to the Academic All-America® University Division Women's Soccer first team. The first team includes four repeat selections and two Scholar-Athletes who were named to the second team in 2008.

Senior defenders **Kristi Eveland** of #4 North Carolina and **Blakely Mattern** of #8 South Carolina joined senior midfielder **Elizabeth Betterbed** of the U.S. Military Academy and graduate student **Theresa Ferraina** of Loyola (Md.) University as repeat selections to the first team.

Senior defender **Emily Anderson** of Texas and senior midfielder **Hailey Beam** of Charlotte, a pair of second team honorees last year, moved up to the first team in 2009.

Second-ranked Portland was the only school with two Scholar-Athletes on the Academic All-America® first team. Junior defender **Jessica Tsao** and sophomore forward **Danielle Foxhoven** represent the Pilots on the first team.

Senior midfielder **Annamarie Hofstetter** of Idaho State, senior midfielder **Jackie Kondratko** of Valparaiso and senior forward **Kelley O'Hara** of top-ranked Stanford complete the 2009 *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® University Division Women's Soccer first team.

A Business Administration major with a 3.86 G.P.A., Eveland is a four-year starter for the Tar Heels, who have a 19-3-1 record this season. She has helped the Carolina defense post 16 shutouts in 2009 while allowing 10 goals in 23 games. A native of Southlake, Texas, she guided North Carolina to its 20th Atlantic Coast Conference championship earlier this month. As part of a UNC defense that posted three shutouts in the ACC Tournament, she earned a berth on the ACC Championship All-Tournament team. In her career, Eveland has played in 103 games and started 99 of them. In those games, she has led a defense that has allowed only 54 goals while the Tar Heels have compiled a 90-9-4 record. A starter for two national championship teams, Eveland has helped North Carolina advance to the third round of the 2009 College Cup and has recorded seven shutouts in a row.

A three-time All-Southeastern Conference first team selection, Mattern is a Business Administration and International Business major with a 3.85 G.P.A. A four-year starter, she led South Carolina to a 19-3-2 record and its first SEC championship. Scoring seven goals with one assist, the Simpsonville, South Carolina native has helped the Gamecocks post 15 shutouts and a 0.53 Goals Against Average. The SEC Scholar-Athlete for women's soccer the last two years, she helped the Gamecocks advance to the third round of the 2009 College Cup.

A native of Fox Island, Washington, Betterbed is a Mechanical Engineering major with a 4.23 G.P.A. After earning first team honors as a defender in 2008, she moved to midfield this season and repeated the honor. The leading scorer for Army with three goals and four assists, she has been ranked number one in her class since her freshman year. An All-Patriot League selection as a junior, she led Army to the Patriot League championship and an NCAA Tournament berth in 2008. A starter in 60 of 73 career games, Betterbed holds the second-highest rank in the Corps of Cadets (4,400) as Deputy Brigade Commander.

A graduate student working on her M.B.A. degree, Ferraina has a 4.00 G.P.A. The 2009 Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year, she led Loyola to the 2009 MAAC championship as well as the regular season MAAC title. A two-time All-MAAC first team selection, she completed her career as the fourth-leading scorer in school history with 25 goals and 15 assists. The Long Branch, New Jersey native was Loyola's top scorer in 2009 with seven goals and three assists. She led Loyola to a 15-5-3 record and a berth in the NCAA College Cup where the Greyhounds lost to West Virginia.

An Accounting major with a perfect 4.00 G.P.A., Anderson was a second team selection on the 2008 *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® Women's Soccer Team. A starter in all 21 games at Texas, she helped the Longhorns post a 9-9-3 record while earning a berth in the Big 12 Conference semi-finals. In addition to scoring a goal with an assist, the Austin, Texas native helped the Longhorn defense post six shutouts and record a 1.09 Goals Against Average.

The all-time leading scorer in Charlotte history with 103 points, Beam is a Finance and Marketing major with a 3.80 G.P.A. A second team Academic All-America® selection in 2008, she led Charlotte to a 16-3-2 record and a second place finish in the Atlantic-10 Conference Tournament as a senior. Beam was Charlotte's leading scorer with 10 goals and 10 assists. A native of Cornelius, N.C., she was named as the Atlantic-10 Scholar-Athlete of the Year for women's soccer the last two seasons. Honored as the A-10 Midfielder of the Year twice, she led the 49ers to back-to-back Atlantic-10 championships in 2007 and 2008. She was also the A-10 Tournament Most Valuable Player twice.

Foxhoven and Tsao have led Portland to a 20-1 record and a number two national ranking. The Pilots advanced to the third round of the 2009 NCAA College Cup with a pair of wins over the weekend.

The lone sophomore named to the Academic All-America® University Division first team, Foxhoven is the second-leading scorer in NCAA Division I with 22 goals and 55 points. A Business major with a 3.75 G.P.A., she was an All-West Coast Conference first team selection. In 2008, she was the WCC Freshman of the Year and earned Freshman All-American honors. The Littleton, Colorado native was the WCC Player of the Week four times.

A Biology major with a 3.98 G.P.A., Tsao has been an outstanding defender for the Pilots. A second team All-WCC pick, she has nine assists this season. A native of Portland, Oregon, Tsao has helped the Portland defense post 15 shutouts while compiling a 0.38 Goals Against Average. A first team All-Region selection as a sophomore, she has been a three-year starter for the Pilots.

A three-time All-Big Sky Conference honoree, Hofstetter is a Microbiology major with a perfect 4.00 G.P.A. While leading the Bengals to a second place finish at the Big Sky Conference Tournament, she tied for the team's scoring lead with five goals and five assists. The Boise, Idaho native is Idaho State's career leader with 24 assists.

A Mechanical Engineering major with a 3.95 G.P.A., Kondratko started all 21 games for Valparaiso. The Crusaders' second-leading scorer with seven goals and four assists, she led Valpo to an 11-9-1 record and a runner-up finish at the Horizon League Tournament. The Granger, Indiana native finished her career as the seventh-leading scorer in school history.

The Pacific-10 Conference Player of the Year in 2009, O'Hara rounds out the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® Women's Soccer first team. A Science, Technology and Society major with a 3.41 G.P.A., she was named second team All-American twice. As a senior, she has led number one-ranked Stanford in scoring, setting school records with 23 goals, 13 assists and 59 points. The leading scorer in the nation with 59 points, the Fayetteville, Ga. native has led undefeated Stanford (22-0-0) to a berth in the third round of the NCAA College Cup.

The 12 members of the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® Women's Soccer first team have an average G.P.A. of 3.90.

A Biomedical Science major with a 4.00 G.P.A., Stanski was a NSCAA All-American Division II first team selection as a junior. A second team selection on the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® Women's Soccer team in 2008, she was also honored as the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) Defensive Player of the Year. In 2008, she led the Lakers to a 21-1 record and the GLIAC title. Grand Valley State entered last year's NCAA Division II Tournament as the top-ranked team in the nation.

As a senior, Stanski has led the Lakers to an 19-0-3 record and a number three national ranking. Overcoming an early-season injury, she has played in 21 matches and started 18 times. She has helped the Lakers' defense post 13 shutouts while compiling an 0.45 Goals Against Average. Named as a second team All-GLIAC selection as a senior, the Tecumseh, Ontario, Canada native has appeared in 80 games and she has scored seven goals and seven assists in her career. In the first round of the NCAA Division II playoffs on Sunday, her penalty kick was the game-winning goal in the Lakers' 1-0 win over Bellarmine.

She is the second consecutive Grand Valley State soccer player to be named as the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® of the Year in the College Division. Last year, **Katy Tafler** won the award.

Stanski is one of 12 members of the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® Women's Soccer College Division first team. There are three repeat selections on the first team while five members of the first team have perfect 4.00 G.P.A.'s.

Senior forward **Taylor Hilinski** of Mercyhurst, senior midfielder **Kaitlin Sanders** of Ohio Northern and senior midfielder **Chantal Koechli** of Wooster were named to the first team for the second year in a row.

Due to a tie in the voting, there are two goalkeepers on the first team, including junior **Tara Carter** of Otterbein and senior **Lauren Sinnenberg** of Williams College. Juniors **Jessica Bennett** of West Chester, **Jenny Knox** of Otterbein and **Jenn Paulucci** of Johns Hopkins join Stanski as defenders on the first team.

Senior **Amy Scheffer** of Ithaca joins Koechli and Sanders as midfielders on the first team.

Senior forward **Kristin Burton** of Armstrong Atlantic State, a third team *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® Women's Soccer College Division pick last year, joins senior **Tassia Augusto** of North Alabama and Hilinski as forwards on the first team.

Ranked ninth in NCAA Division III, Otterbein (19-1-1) was the only school that placed two Scholar-Athletes on the Academic All-America® College Division first team.

A Biology Education major with a perfect 4.00 G.P.A. and a minor in Special Education, Hilinski led Mercyhurst in scoring with 14 goals as a senior. A native of Erie, Pa., she finished her career with 43 goals and 97 points, the seventh-leading scorer in program history. A two-time All-PSAC selection, she led the Lakers to three consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances.

A three-time All-Ohio Athletic Conference first team selection, Sanders led Ohio Northern to a 15-5-2 record and its first NCAA Division III Tournament appearance. A Pharmacy major with a 3.96 G.P.A., she was ONU's second-leading scorer with six goals and 13 assists. Named as the OAC Midfielder of the Year twice, the Kendallville, Indiana native finished her career with 17 goals and 35 assists. She is third on ONU's career list with 35 assists.

A Biochemistry and Molecular Biology major with a 3.97 G.P.A., Koechli was a two-time all-conference first team pick at Wooster. The Greer, South Carolina native had four goals and four assists while leading Wooster to an 11-4-4 record as a senior. Koechli finished her career with 12 goals and 22 assists and earned all-region honors as a junior. A member of the Phi Beta Kappa national honor society, she finished second in program history in assists.

Carter and Knox have led Otterbein to a 20-1-1 record and back-to-back Ohio Athletic Conference titles. The Cardinals advanced to the third round of the NCAA Division III Tournament on Sunday with a 1-0 win over Denison.

An Art and Art History major with a 4.00 G.P.A., Carter is a three-year starter at goalkeeper for the Cardinals. As a senior, she was named first team All-OAC while allowing only five goals in 1,818 minutes of action. With a 0.25 Goals Against Average, she ranks second in NCAA Division III. She also ranks among the national leaders with 16 shutouts. A native of Pickerington, Ohio, Carter is a member of Phi Beta Sigma.

A three-year starter at midfield for the Cardinals, Knox is an Allied Health major with a 4.00 G.P.A. Honored as a third team NSCAA All-American in 2008, she is the second-leading scorer for Otterbein with five goals and two assists. A native of Gahanna, Ohio, Knox was named first team All-OAC for the second year in a row.

Sinnenberg, who has led #2 Williams to a 19-0-0 record, joined Carter as the goalkeepers on the first team. A Biology major with a 3.88 G.P.A., Sinnenberg was a first team NSCAA All-American selection as a junior. In 2009, she has posted four solo shutouts while compiling an 0.58 Goals Against Average. A native of Westfield, N.J., she is a two-time All-NESCAC first team selection who has 32 shutouts in her career.

An All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference selection at defender, Bennett is an Elementary Education major with a 4.00 G.P.A. A three-year starter on defense, she led the fifth-ranked Rams to a 19-2-1 record and the PSAC championship. In addition to scoring five goals with two assists, the Littlestown, Pa. native has contributed to a West Chester defense that has posted 17 shutouts with a national-leading 0.21 Goals Against Average.

A Biomedical Engineering major with a 3.96 G.P.A., Paulucci has led Johns Hopkins to an 18-3-0 record and its fifth straight Centennial Conference title. Named as a first team NSCAA All-American as a sophomore, Paulucci was named first team all-conference twice. The Manalapan, N.J. native has led the Blue Jays to 15 shutouts and an 0.38 Goals Against Average. Hopkins advanced to the third round of the NCAA Division III Tournament on Sunday.

An Accounting major with a 3.85 G.P.A., Scheffer joined Koechli and Sanders as midfielders on the Academic All-America® Women's Soccer College Division first team. A starter in 21 games, she has led Ithaca to a 15-4-2 record. A third team NSCAA All-American pick as a junior, she has been named first team All-Empire Eight twice. The Schenectady, N.Y. native has a team-leading 14 goals with 3 assists for 41 points. The second-leading scorer in school history with 36 goals and 92 points, she was the MVP at the Empire Eight Tournament the last two years.

The leading scorer in North Alabama history with 62 goals and 22 assists, Augusto is a Health, Physical Education and Recreation major with a 3.67 G.P.A. As a senior, she scored 28 goals with 6 assists while leading the Lions to the best season in school history. The Lions finished the year with a 19-4-1 record and earned their first-ever NCAA Division II Tournament appearance, earning a win over Florida Southern in the first round. A native of Sao Paulo, Brazil, Augusto was a three-time All-Gulf South Conference first team selection.

A Physical Therapy major with a 3.68 G.P.A., Burton led 14th-ranked Armstrong Atlantic State to a 16-4-3 record and the Peach Belt Conference title and an NCAA Division II Tournament berth. The PBC Offensive Player of the Year, she ranks among the NCAA Division II leaders with 31 goals and 14 assists. A native of Ocala, Fla., Burton holds the school and the conference career records with 95 goals and 225 points. In her career, she was named as the Peach Belt Conference Player of the Week 13 times.

The 12 members of the *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America® Women's Soccer College Division first team have a cumulative G.P.A. of 3.91.

To be eligible, a student-athlete must be a varsity starter or key reserve, maintain a cumulative grade point average of 3.30 on a scale of 4.00, have reached sophomore athletic and academic standings at his/her current institution and be nominated by his/her sports information director. Since the program's inception in 1952, CoSIDA has bestowed Academic All-America honors on more than 14,000 student-athletes in Divisions I, II, III and NAIA, covering all NCAA championship sports.

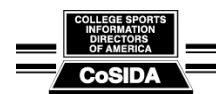
